# Workshop: Globalizing Rivalry?

Sino-Japanese Interaction in World Politics

Graduate School of  
East Asian Studies



By discussing the global and cross-regional dimension of Sino-Japanese cooperation and conflict, this workshop aims at elucidating the consequences of one of the most significant interstate rivalries in world politics. The mounting rivalry between Japan and China has been a key aspect of world politics since the early 1990s. While a vast body of literature has analyzed this issue, the analytical focus has for the most part been on the rivalry within the East Asian region, but reaching beyond East Asia has been largely neglected. Through theoretical and empirical analyses, the workshop focuses on the questions if, why and how this Sino-Japanese power struggle within East Asia also affects Japan's and China's foreign policy approaches beyond East Asia's regional boundaries. To develop and improve explanations of the mutual influences of Japan's and China's foreign policy on the global and cross-regional level, the workshop addresses two important but understudied questions: First, how do interstate rivalries influence foreign policy approaches beyond regional boundaries? Second, which factors influence Sino-Japanese rivalry in different regions and on different levels of the international system?
